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# Why PPCR in Tajikistan?



- Climate change is a direct threat to the Tajikistan's socio-economic and environmental systems
  - Sharp increase in the intensity and frequency of extreme events resulting from dramatic fluctuations in the hydrological cycle especially from glacial retreat
  - Significant impacts on water resources with implication for:
    - energy security,
    - food security and
    - rural livelihoods

# Why PPCR in Tajikistan?



## Low institutional and technical capacity to adapt

- Severe weakness in national systems for hydromet data and limited access to climate change information;
- Key gaps in the science base, especially on glacial melt and climate impacts in mountainous terrain;
- Low awareness of government officials, business circles, and the public;
- Lack of qualified personnel in government, academia and education system;
- Lack of integration of climate change risk management in national development strategies and sectoral investment plans.



# Tajikistan's Approach



- The key is meaningful engagement of stakeholders to:
  - Ensure the consistency of PPCR investments with the country's development priority needs and with the efforts of the IFIs operating in the country
  - Encourage acceptability of the PPCR goals among a wide range of actors in the country
- Key stakeholders include
  - Government departments and agencies, MDBs, international organisations, experts, communities, NGOs, civil society, etc.



## **Progress of Tajikistan PPCR**



- ✓ PPCR started in September 2009
- ✓ 1<sup>st</sup> Joint Programming Mission of the MDBs with broad stakeholder consultation in October 2009
- ✓ Mid-term Mission of the MDBs with broad consultation on Phase 1Grant Application in March 2010
- ✓ Grant Proposal being finalised
- ✓ Initial discussion on the Strategic Programme for Climate Resilience being conducted

## October 2009 Joint Programming Mission



- Representation from all Development Banks
- Engagement at highest levels of Government
- Two-day stake-holder workshop and media roundtable
- Stock-taking of GoT and development partner efforts on adaptation and related sector programs
- 5 Field trips over 3 days to current adaptation projects
- Shaped key sectoral and cross-sector themes for drafting Phase 1 grant application

# **PPCR Priorities in Tajikistan**



- ✓ Key potential themes identified by the Joint Mission and subsequent consultation:
  - Country-level actions
  - Sector-level actions
  - Project level actions
  - Local and community level actions

## Potential actions at the country level



- Strengthening the capacity of the country to produce and utilize better climate data and climate science;
- Enhancing the institutional structures to manage inter-sectoral climate risks;
- Building stronger linkages between poverty reduction, human development and climate resilience goals.

#### Potential actions at the sectoral level



- Reducing the vulnerability of the energy sector to climate variability and change;
- Strengthening country capacity to deal with climate-related disasters;
- Building resilience of the agricultural sector and rural economy to reduce its vulnerability to climate change threats;
- Assessing the vulnerability of road infrastructure

## Potential actions at the project level



- Advancing screening of projects to assess climate risks, and piloting transformational approaches to increase climate resilience to support longer-term sustainability of existing and future investments
- Integrating local knowledge and adaptation initiatives into project design and implementation practices

#### Potential actions at the local level



 Ensuring consideration of the needs and participation of vulnerable groups, particularly the rural poor, women, children and minority groups




## **PPCR Phase 1 Programme work plan**
